- (c) Autobiographical elements in "The Mill on the Floss".
- (d) Physical and intellectual inertia of Prufrock in "The Love Song of J. Alfred Prufrock".
- (e) Inter-war social structure in "Mrs. Dalloway".
- (f) Moorthy's commitment to non-violence as a protest method in "Kanthapura".

- 2. "Milton's approach to the invocation of the muse in Paradise Lost Book I sets the pattern for all of the Paradise Lost." Argue in favour or against this statement with sufficient proof and logic.[30]
- 3. "It is a truth universally acknowledged that a single man in possession of a good fortune, must be in want of a wife." Discuss these lines of "Pride and Prejudice" from feminist point of view.[30]
- 4. How is the "Tess of the d' Urbervilles" an indictment of the class system of English society near the end of the 19th century?

- 5. Discuss W.H. Auden's 'Musee des Beaux Arts' as a text focussing human suffering, tragedy and pain. [30]
- 6. Philip Larkin's style is a "Piquant mixture of lyricism and discontent". Discuss with sound arguments and textual evidences. [30]
- 7. Paul's close relationship with his mother has provoked many Freudian and Oedipal readings of "Sons and Lovers". Discuss. [30]
